- 1) Every true believer is sealed with the Holy Spirit. (Romans 8:9) "But ye are not in the flesh, but in the Spirit, if so be that the Spirit of God dwell in you. Now if any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of his."
- 2) This takes place right after one believes. (Ephesians 1:13) "In whom ye also trusted, after that ye heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation: in whom also after that ye believed, ye were sealed with that holy Spirit of promise,"
- 3) Being sealed by the Holy Spirit assures the true believer that he belongs to God, his salvation is authentic, he is secure and he cannot lose his salvation.
- 4) Being sealed by the Holy Spirit assures us that we are teammates with other true believers.
